History of Mobile



- Explored in 1519 by the Spanish and settled in 1559 but abandoned after hurricane
- Settled by French in 1702
- Later served as the temporary Capital of British West Florida
- Became an American City in 1813

History of Mobile



- Oldest port in the region
- Became one of the nation's multicultural cities
- Site of the last slave ship to enter the US.
- Original home to Mardi Gras



Economy of Mobile

Economy of Mobile



- Grew to be one of the nation's largest deep water ports
- Port boomed from cotton and timber imports
- Became a significant ship building center during World War II era.
- Home to Brookley Field Air Base

Economic Impacts



- Closure of Brookley Field
- Hurricanes Ivan and Katrina
- Closure of nearby International Paper Plant
- Closure of Cruise Line Terminal
- Financial crisis of 2008

Economic Statistics in 2008



- Poverty rate of 51%
- ■Unemployment rate of 8.1% compared to US rate of 3.7%
- Per Capita Incomef\$12,394 compared to \$21,587 US income



Mobile's Brownfields Program

Mobile's Brownfields Strategy



- Seek funding assistance from EPA's Brownfields Program
- Partner with EPA's TAB Program
- Prepare a Communitywide Assessment Grant
- Focus on downtown first (Hank Aaron Loop)
- Develop an inventory of sites

Mobile's Brownfields Strategy



- Identify anarea (Mobile's Auto Alley)
- Develop a vision for that area (Technology Corridor)
- Identify potential catalyst site

The Old Buick Building



Site Characteristics



- •40,000 sf building unoccupied for 13 years
- Placed on National Register of Historical Places
- Phase I ESA identified several Recognized Environmental Conditions (RECs)
- Phase II ESA identified PAHs in soil and some limited asbestos in building

Building Redevelopment



- Developer (Rogers Willard) decided to redevelop building due to relatively low environmental risk.
- Building was redeveloped into office building
- Three different companimitally moved in including Rogers & Willard (30 employees).
- Atlanta-based software development firm shifted its operations with 100 employees to building 2015

Catalyst Success!



- Rogers & Willard also renovætejalcent building and property of former 1921-vintage Dodge Brothers Automobile
- Precision Engineers with 70 employeers hased and moved into this adjacent property and have expanded to over 100 employees.
- Thomas Roofing & Sheet MetaCompany redeveloped site one block west

Catalyst Success!



- ACE Engineeringredeveloped adjoining site to southwest
- WheelerLofts Apartments redeveloped adjoining site to north
- Old Majestic Brewing Company redeveloped nearby
- Sixteenother similar projects are currently underway in Mobile
