
#### **OBLR Supports Brownfields Revitalization**

# Types of Brownfields Funding

- Multipurpose Grants
- Assessment Grants
- Revolving Loan Fund Grants
- Cleanup Grants
- Environmental Workforce and Job Training Grants
- Technical Assistance, Training, and Research Grants
- State and Tribal Funding

# Brownfields Assessments

Grant and technical assistance support for sites with known or potential contamination:

- Inventory: Compile a list of brownfields
- Characterization: Identify past uses
- Assessment: Determine existing contamination
- Area-Wide ,Site-specific Cleanup and Redevelopment Planning: Scope and plan process for site assessment, cleanup and reuse
- **Community Involvement:** Inform and engage stakeholders
- **Multipurpose:** inventory, characterize, and assess brownfield sites



# Brownfields Assessment Grants

- Community-wide Assessment Grants:
  - Who Can Apply: A Community-wide Assessment Grant is appropriate when a specific site is not identified and the applicant plans to spend grant funds on more than one brownfield site in its community
  - Funding: up to \$300,000
- Site-specific Assessment Grants:
  - Who can apply A Site-specific Assessment Grant is appropriate when a specific site is identified and the applicant plans to spend grant funds on this one site only
  - Funding: up to \$200,000
- Assessment Coalition Grants
  - Who can apply: for three or more eligible entities that will submit one grant proposal under the name of one of the coalition members (the 'lead' coalition member) and will perform assessment grant activities in each coalition member's community
  - Funding: up to \$600,000
- Multipurpose grants
  - Who can apply: provide funding to eligible entities to carry out a range of eligible activities, including inventory, characterizing, and assessing brownfield sites; community involvement related to brownfields; cleanup activities on brownfields sites owned by the applicant; and developing site reuse plans and/or an overall plan for revitalization
  - Funding: up to \$800,000



# Brownfields Cleanup

- Cleanup Grants : cleanup planning and contaminant abatement at one or more sites owned by the recipient.
- **Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Grants:** capitalize a RLF program to provide loans and subgrants for cleanups.
- Multipurpose Grants: cleanup activities on brownfield sites, developing site reuse plans, and/or an overall plan for revitalization



# Brownfields Cleanup Grant Funding

Grants provide funding to carry out cleanup activities at one or more brownfield site(s):

- **Cleanup Grants :** An eligible entity must own the site at the time of application and may apply for up to \$500,000 per site.
- Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Grants: an eligible entity may apply for up to \$1 million or coalitions of eligible entities may apply together for up to \$1 million per entity



# Brownfields Multipurpose Grant Funding

- Up to \$800,000 to assess and cleanup brownfield sites
- Multipurpose Grants require a \$40,000 cost share
- Applicants should demonstrate how grant funds will result in at least:
  - one Phase II environmental site assessment;
  - one brownfield site cleanup; and
  - an overall plan for revitalization of one or more brownfield sites, if there is not already a plan in place.



#### Brownfields Job Training Grants

- Grants provide funding to recruit, train, and place unemployed and under-employed residents of communities affected by solid and hazardous waste.
- Support training in programs across EPA: solid waste, Superfund, brownfields, emergency response, waste and stormwater, chemical safety, etc.
- Funding up to \$200,000



# Technical Assistance (TA)

Technical Assistance to Brownfields Communities (TAB Program)

Provides geographically-based technical assistance and training to communities and other stakeholders on brownfield issues.


Available to help guide communities through the cleanup and redevelopment process. TAB Grantees can offer assistance with:

- preparing grant proposals;
- performing site inventories;
- reviewing historical information;
- design of the investigation/sampling/field analysis; and
- cleanup and redevelopment planning.



## **Technical Assistance By Region**

#### Technical Assistance to Brownfields (TAB) Providers



Assist specific regions with TA and training to communities and other stakeholders on brownfield issues, such as:

- preparing grant applications;
- performing site inventories;
- reviewing historical information;
- design of
  - investigation/sampling/field analysis; and
- cleanup and redevelopment planning.



# State and Tribal Response Program Funding

- Section 128(a) Funding
- \$50 million per year for states, tribes and territories
- Awarded and administered by the EPA regional offices
- Eligible Entities:
  - •State (as defined in CERCLA § 101(27))
  - Indian tribe (as defined in CERCLA § 101(36))
  - •Intertribal consortia (as defined in the Federal Register Notice at 67 FR 67181)




